The Alpine Cabinet Company Construction Management Scholarship is provided by the company and is awarded in the sum of \$2,000 to an undergraduate majoring in Construction Management. Preference is given to an in-state student.

After receiving a certificate in Construction Management from Red Rocks Community College, **Daniel Rosin** continued his education at Colorado State. He is a member of the Associated General Contractors Student Chapter and serves as a senator in the Residence Hall Association. Daniel's long term career plans include becoming a superintendent for a commercial construction company.

The American Society of Professional Estimators Denver Chapter 5 Scholarship is provided for Construction Management students who have at least two semesters remaining toward their degrees. Recipients must be undergraduate students with a minimum 2.75 GPA, have demonstrated financial need, and be planning a career in the construction industry. This year's award is for \$1,250.

Kyle Whitham has been named to the Dean's Honor Roll and is a member of the Construction Management Estimating Club. He volunteers as an assistant coach for a high school baseball team and is currently an apprentice electrician. His long term career goal is to own and operate a custom home building construction firm.

The American Society of Professional Estimators Denver Chapter 5-Eugene L. Joerns Scholarship is awarded to Construction Management students who have at least two semesters remaining toward their degrees. Recipients must be undergraduate students with a minimum of 2.75 GPA, have demonstrated financial need, and be planning a career in the construction industry. This year's award is for \$1,250.

Michael Brown attended Eckerd College in Florida before transferring to Colorado State to pursue a degree in Construction Management. He is interested in becoming a project manager for a green building construction company and perhaps owning a construction company in the future.

The Randolph B. Coleman, Jr. Memorial Scholarship was established in 1991 in memory of Randy, a 1980 graduate of the Construction Management program who died in a 1988 bicycle accident. The \$2,450 award is given to a Construction Management undergraduate whose work experience in the building trade demonstrates professional interest in the field of construction.

Zeberian Packard transferred to Colorado State after receiving an Associate's degree from Aims Community College. He is a member of the Design Build Institute of America Student Chapter and operates a handyman business. After receiving a degree in Construction Management, Zeb plans to work abroad in the area of renewable energy systems.

The Colorado Asphalt Pavement Association Scholarship is given by the Colorado Asphalt Pavement Association (CAPA) to a junior or senior who maintains a 2.5 GPA and shows a demonstrated interest in asphalt technology and/or road construction industry. This year's award of \$3,000 each is divided between two students.

After attending Central Michigan University, **Parker Collins** transferred to Colorado State to pursue a degree in Construction Management. The Construction Workforce Foundation Scholarship is presented to junior, senior, or graduate students majoring in a field related to highway or municipal utility construction industry. Recipients must maintain a 2.5 GPA. Preference is given to Colorado residents who are members of the Associated General Contractors Student Chapter. This year's award is \$1,500.

After attending Central Michigan University, **Parker Collins** transferred to Colorado State to pursue a degree in Construction Management. He is a past recipient of the Army Commendation Medal and is a member of the Emerging Green Builders Club. He is also a member of the National Guard where he is enrolled in Officer Candidate School. Parker plans to become an officer in the U.S. Army and is also the recipient of the Colorado Asphalt Pavement Association Scholarship.

The Colorado Roofing Association Scholarship is presented to junior, third-year students having earned more than 60 credit hours, and graduate students majoring in Construction Management. Recipients must maintain a 2.5 GPA, be Colorado residents, and show financial need. This year's scholarship is \$2,000.

David Carlson is a past recipient of the Mason's Scholarship and is a member of the Emerging Green Builders Club. He is also interested in forming a racquetball club here at Colorado State. David formerly studied abroad and plans to become a project manager for a commercial construction company where he can contribute as an energetic manager.

The Construction Financial Management Association – Colorado Chapter Scholarship was established by the Association in 2000. Recipients of the \$2,625 award must show good citizenship and strong character, as well as have potential for leadership.

Ashley Linfield is a member of the Women in Construction Club and volunteers with Habitat for Humanity. She is a past recipient of the PEO Scholarship and the John Guthrie Memorial Scholarship. While attending school she works for a construction company and plans to become a senior estimator or senior project manager for an established construction company.

The Construction Management Diversity Scholarship is awarded to undergraduates with preference given to freshmen or transfer students new to the Construction Management program from underrepresented populations. Contributions to this endowed fund have come from construction companies and related firms. The award automatically renews if a 2.2 GPA is maintained. Five students share the \$8,000 award.

Christopher Gillespie volunteers with Tiyospaye, a non-profit organization that assists Native American families. He attended Front Range Community College where he received certificates in Arts and Welding and served as an English tutor. Christopher plans a career in construction and would like to own a contracting business in the future.

Teal Pace is a past recipient of the Distinguished Scholars Award and is a member of the Design Build Institute of America Student Chapter and the Emerging Green Builders Club. She attended Front Range Community College before coming to Colorado State and plans a career with a construction company that embraces sustainable building practices and creates structures that work well with the surrounding environment.

Amanda Poindexter is a former recipient of the PTCO Scholarship and the Construction Management Diversity Scholarship. She has served as secretary/treasurer of the Women in Construction Club and media specialist for the Emerging Green Builders Club. After graduation, Amanda would like to work with her father in his construction company and eventually pursue a career in green building.

Logan Rowe is a native of Hawaii and is a member of Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity and the Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu competition team. He also participates in several community service projects such as park clean-ups and chaperoning middle school dances. Logan plans a career working for a commercial construction firm.

Recipients of the \$1,000 award must maintain a 2.75 GPA and show a career interest in residential wood frame construction with an emphasis on multi-family building. This year five scholarships were awarded.

Brian Boydston is a former recipient of the Trueblood Business Scholarship and the Youder Scholarship. A double major of Construction Management and Business Administration, he serves as president of his church's religious student organization and volunteers for the Rocky Mountain Raptor Program. Brian plans a career in the green building construction area.

A former recipient of the Fairfield Scholarship, **Blake Courtney** was a member of the competition team that placed third in the Rocky Mountain Design Build Competition. He serves as secretary of the Design Build Institute of America Student Chapter and is a member of the Emerging Green Builders Club. Blake minors in Spanish and would like to establish a program that would offer students the opportunity to learn construction concepts in Central and South America.

A non-traditional student, he worked in construction for several years before returning to school. He has been named to the Dean's Honor Roll and plans a career working in the home construction area, either in new construction or remodeling.

The Labor/Management Cooperative Committee of Colorado Scholarship for \$5,000 is awarded to a sophomore, junior, or senior in Construction Management with a minimum 2.5 GPA. Recipients must be Colorado residents with at least two semesters remaining to complete their degrees, and have an immediate family member who is a Mountain West Regional Council of

Carpenters (MWRCC) member or works for a construction company with a signed labor agreement with the MWRCC.

Ronald Sackett is a former recipient of the Labor Management Scholarship and the Arapahoe Sales Professionals Scholarship. He is a member of the Associated General Contractors (AGC) Student Chapter and Phi Theta Kappa National Honor Society. He was a member of the AGC competition team which placed first in the region. Ron volunteers as a youth football official and plans a career as a project manager after spending several years in the industry.

The Matthew Martinez Memorial Scholarship is given in memory of Matthew, a student who died while in Construction Management. The \$1,215 award is given by family and friends of Matthew to a Construction Management undergraduate who has a GPA of 2.5 or higher.

Fonda Budai is a non-traditional student who is the single mother of three children. She received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Music from Colorado State and served in the U.S. Air Force. She serves as choir director at her church and volunteers at local elementary schools. Her future career plans are to become a project manager for a construction company in northern Colorado.

The Raquel Martinez Memorial Scholarship was established in 2005 in memory of a 2000 Construction Management graduate who died in 2001 of leukemia. The \$1,250 award is given to a Construction Management undergraduate who demonstrates financial need and has a GPA of 2.5 or higher.

Lara Jolly is a former recipient of the Fairfield Scholarship and the Hensel Phelps Scholarship. She attended Washington State University before transferring to Colorado State. She was a member of the competition team that participated in the Associated General Contractors national competition and volunteers for Habitat for Humanity. She plans a career working in the commercial construction industry.

The Tom McMahon Memorial Scholarship was established by friends and family of Tom, one of the best superintendents to have ever worked in the commercial industry. This \$5,000 scholarship is awarded to two students who have completed one year in Construction Management and rank in the top half of Construction Management classes. Selection is also based on the individual's passion for commercial construction, leadership ability, and strong character. The recipient must understand that to complete a quality project it takes the respect of all involved: owners, architects, suppliers, subcontractors, and especially your crew.

Maria Delgado has been named to the Dean's Honor Roll the past two years and is a former recipient of the Associated Builders and Contractors Scholarship, Construction Management Association of America Scholarship, and Hensel Phelps Scholarship. She is a member of the Women in Construction Club and Design Build Institute of America Student Chapter. She teaches a first grade Sunday School class and this summer helped build a house in Mexico. After graduation, Maria plans to pursue a Master's degree in Architecture.

A member of the Sigma Lambda Chi Honor Society, **Christopher Harmon** has been named to the Dean's Honor Roll and is a member of the Associated Builders and Contractors Student Chapter. He attended Front Range Community College where he received an Associate of Arts degree. He plans to become a superintendent of a construction company.

He would like to pursue a career with a construction company that develops and constructs golf courses.

The Courtney Petersen/HRH Construction Industry

Scholarship is provided by HRH, a full-service insurance and bonding broker with the historical focus of serving the construction industry in Colorado and the western region of the U.S. Courtney Peterson was a long-time employee of HRH and the company recognizes his contributions with a scholarship fund for Construction Management students. The recipient is a junior, senior, or graduate student with a minimum GPA of 3.0. This year's award is \$1,800.

Kyle Vance is a former recipient of the Delano F. Scott Scholarship and the Peterson/HRH Construction Scholarship. He is a member of the Rocky Mountain Mechanical Contractors Association Student Chapter and was a member of Colorado State's mechanical team which placed first in the national competition. Kyle would like to pursue a career as a field superintendent for an electrical subcontracting firm.

The Retail Contractors Association (RCA) was founded in 1990 and its membership is comprised of about 100 retail general contractors from around the country. The RCA promotes education, ethics, and overall excellence in the retail construction industry. **The RCA Scholarship** of \$1,500 is awarded to an undergraduate student in Construction Management who is interested in pursuing a career in commercial construction following graduation. The recipient must be a full time student in good academic standing.

Brian Rankin's future plans include becoming a project manager for a commercial construction company. He is a member of the Design Build Institute of America Student Chapter and Phi Eta Sigma Honor Society. He participates in intramural football and has been named to the Dean's Honor Roll.

The James H. Short Scholarship is named for Mr. Short who was a member of the Construction Management Industry Advisory Committee. The \$1,800 award is given to Colorado or Wyoming high school graduates who are majoring in Construction Management and rank in the upper one-third of their class.

She volunteers with Habitat for Humanity and the Larimer County Humane Society. Sacha would like to pursue a career as a project manager of a commercial construction company.

The Jason Daniel Wheeler Memorial Scholarship is awarded annually by John D. (Dan) Wheeler and Gretchen F. Wheeler (parents), and other friends and family of Jason Wheeler. This scholarship was established in memory of Jason, an undergraduate majoring in Construction Management at the time of his death in 1994. This \$2,500 scholarship is awarded to a Construction Management undergraduate who is a Colorado resident, has financial need, is in the upper one-half of his or her class, and who has demonstrated leadership ability.
